

#### **Welcome to Student-Led Conferences!**

On October 27th and 28th, Steller will be holding student-led conferences for all students. Student-led conferences are a chance for parents and students to meet with advisors to discuss student's successes and struggles at the beginning of the new school year. The staff at Steller feels that student-led conferences will benefit all students by opening up lines of communication between parents, students, and the advisor. We will be holding a second set of conferences in February to check back in with families and students. We believe that student involvement in the conferences makes learning active, provides opportunities for students to self-reflect and evaluate their performance, and encourages students to accept responsibility for their learning.



To prepare for the conferences, students will create a portfolio representing work from all of their classes during the first quarter of school. The students will conduct the conference detailing skills and processes

learned, and share goals they have set to further improve themselves. Students will be taught how to select representative work, how to write self-reflective evaluations, and how to diagnose their own strengths and weaknesses. It is critical that your child is present to lead his/her conference.



Conferences will be scheduled on Wednesday October 27 from 12:30 to 3:30 and 4:30 to 7:00. The same schedule will take place on Thursday the 28th of October. Students will be dismissed at 11:45 on both days. A

twenty-five minute time block will be scheduled with your family in advance for the student-led conferences.

Scheduling options will be sent home through advisors. The advisor will be present to support students and parents during their conference, but the students will be leading the conference.


Advisors, students, and parents all play important roles in the student-led conferences. The following are some tips to help parents feel better prepared.

#### **Before the conference:**

- ∞ Confirm a conference time that works for you and your family
- ∞ Make a list of questions to bring with you to the conference
- ∞ Arrive on time with your child

#### **During the conference:**

- ∞ Ask follow-up questions to help your child reflect on his/her learning
- ∞ Take notes to help remind you of possible discussion points



#### After the conference:

- Schedule an additional conference if you feel you need more time or further clarification or wish to meet with a specific classroom teacher
- Remember to fill out an evaluation about your conference to help us improve our implementation

#### Dear Parents/Guardians of Eleventh Grade Students,

The Anchorage School District will be giving 11<sup>th</sup>-graders the nationally standardized ACT *WorkKeys* assessments in three entry-level academic skills that employers find most value:

- ∞ reading for information
- ∞ applied mathematics
- ∞ and *locating information*

The ACT Company has done extensive research on thousands of occupations to find the skills that successful employees actually use on the job. Students with these academic skills are more prepared to learn specific skills on the job and to succeed in training after high school. *WorkKeys* can help students see the connection between their high school classes and their futures.

Students *may* receive a nationally recognized credential. This *National Career Readiness Certificate (NCRC)* documents their achievement in the three skills areas mentioned above. *NCRCs* and score reports can be shown to prospective employers and listed on resumes' and job applications. Many employers nationwide now look for career readiness certificates.

**WorkKeys** assessments use a scoring system of 3 to 6 or 7, depending on the test. The higher the student's skill level, the more jobs he or she will be better prepared to enter.

ACT awards National Career Readiness Certificates at four levels. Students who score at least 6 on all three WorkKeys assessments receive the *Platinum Credential*. Those who lowest score is 5 on any of the three assessments receive the Gold Credential. Students whose lowest score is 4 on any test receive the Silver Credential, and those whose lowest score is a 3 on any test receive the Bronze Credential.

Parents can use WorkKeys as an opportunity to talk to their students about career interests, the skills that employers look for, and the relevance of school to future employment. For more information about WorkKeys you can go to <a href="https://www.act.org/workkeys">www.act.org/workkeys</a>.

WorkKeys can become a valuable piece of the puzzle for students as they examine their career goals. Preparing for the National Career Readiness Certificate helps students define career goals and build the skills that employers and post-high school training programs want to see.

Here are some other ways you can help your student explore the future:

- Talk about your own job and how you decided on your occupational area. Ask family members and friends to share their educational and work experiences with your student
- ∞ Ask your student about his/her interests and abilities.
- → Point out examples of occupations you encounter in daily life, such as teacher, pharmacist, construction worker, dental hygienist, office worker, plumber, carpet layer, sales person, tour guide, chef, welder, ship worker, truck driver, real estate agent, banker, store clerk, fast food worker, utility worker, receptionist, etc.
- Talk to your student about broad career areas and the variety of occupations that fall under an area. For example if your child is interested in healthcare, there is an assortment of occupations with varying levels of training that he or she might consider, such as pharmacist, x-ray technician, doctor, medical receptionist, dental hygienist, nurse, physician assistant, physical therapist, dentist, medical billing specialist, pharmacy technician, dietician, and many more.
- ∞ Encourage your student to talk to his/her school guidance counselor or career resource advisor for more information on career & technical high school and college programs, apprenticeships, occupational certificates, and 2 and 4-year degrees.

Parents and students please remember, as with all standardized tests, *students are not allowed to have any electronic device on their person* during this test. It would be best if they could leave all such items at home for the duration of the testing period. The stakes are very high for these exams and it would be a tragedy if anyone's test should be invalidated due to possession of one of these devices.

As time draws near I will keep you posted of any changes that should occur.

Steller Secondary is a unique educational setting within the Anchorage School District. #### Red Ribbon Week 10/23 - 10/31 2010

Steller Secondary will be celebrating Red Ribbon Week again this year in an effort to educate our students about the dangers of substance abuse and encourage a healthy lifestyle.

Red Ribbon Week is a National Campaign that was initiated after drug traffickers in Mexico murdered DEA Agent Enrique "Kiki" Camarena. I would encourage you to get more information about Red Ribbon Week and talk with your student about substance abuse

#### What you can do:

- Talk to your children about the dangers of drug abuse.
- ∞ Set clear rules for your children about not using drugs.
- Set a good example for your children by not using illegal drugs or medicine without a prescription.
- Monitor your children's behavior and enforce appropriate consequences, so that your rules are respected.

∞ Encourage family and friends to follow the same guidelines to keep children safe from substance abuse.



Tips for parents to prevent prescription drug abuse from The National Family Partnership (WWW.NFP.ORG)

- ∞ If your child is on prescribed medication, monitor the dosages and refills. Set clear rules, such as, not sharing and always following proper dosages.
- Warn your youngsters that taking prescription or OTC drugs without a doctor's supervision can be just as dangerous and potentially lethal as taking street drugs.
- ∞ Supervise your child's Internet use: many pharmacy sites are not regulated and will sell your child medications without prescriptions.
- ∞ Properly dispose of old, expired or unused medicines in the trash. Hide or mix them with cat litter or coffee grounds before throwing them away in an empty can or bag.
- DO NOT flush medications down the drain or toilet, unless the label indicates it is safe to do so.

#### Cold & Flu Season

The official start of the flu season is the month of October. Although Steller has seen it's fair share of sick students, it will likely get worse before it gets better (our flu season peaks in February and does not decline until School attendance is important, however, a sick student who appears ill should remain home. Please do not send a sick student to school to be examined by the This may expose others to unnecessary illnesses. \*Parents are notified before students are excused from school for illness. Please make sure your contact number(s) are kept current throughout the year and notify us when your student will be staying with a family friend or family member. # What can families, students, and school personnel do to keep from getting sick and spreading the flu?

- ∞ Cover your mouth and nose. The main way that the flu spreads is from person to person in the droplets produced by coughs and sneezes, so cover coughs or sneezes with your elbow instead of your hand. If you are wearing short sleeves, use a tissue and wash your hands immediately.
- Practice good hand hygiene. Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after coughing or sneezing. Hand sanitizers are also effective.


- Stay home if you are sick. Keeping sick students at home means that they keep their viruses to themselves rather than sharing them with others. Sick people should stay at home until at least 24 hours after they no longer have a fever or signs of a fever (without the use of fever-reducing medicine).
- ∞ Clean surfaces and items that are more likely to have frequent hand contact such as desks, door knobs, keyboards, phones, or pens, with cleaning agents that are usually used in these areas.

#### Other important illness information:

- Aspirin (acetylsalicylic acid) should not be given to children or teenagers; this can cause a rare but serious illness called Reye's syndrome.
- ∞ Contact your health care provider if you have an underlying respiratory illness or severe symptoms occur. Severe symptoms include: dehydration, not eating, listless, delusional, or unable to keep down any food or fluids, high fevers despite fever reducers, you have a high fever with rash, getting sick again after getting better, or with questions/concerns.

#### **Nurse Wendy**



Spice, also known as K2, is a plant material similar to marijuana that is laced with synthetic compound chemicals.

Users smoke or mix the product in food or drink to get high.

Synthetic Marijuana is often advertised as incense and is legal to purchase in Alaska.

The product may cause adverse side effects and has sent many teens to the hospital emergency room.



Synthetic marijuana is packaged with many different labels and names.



#### Synthetic Marijuana

Synthetic marijuana is made up of dried herbs and spices that are sprayed with synthetic substances that mimic THC, a natural psychoactive ingredient found in marijuana. The synthetic substance can be 3–800 times more potent than THC. Because the product is unregulated, it is legal to purchase and is growing in popularity as an alternative to marijuana. Many times the product packaging lists the substance as herbal incense and sometimes includes information that it is "not for human consumption."

#### Effect of use

Hospitals have reported incidents of people, mostly teenagers, with the following symptoms: elevated blood pressure, rapid heart rate, anxiety, intense hallucinations, tremors, seizures, numbness/tingling and vomiting. There have been reported cases where teens have lapsed into comas caused by the use of synthetic marijuana.

The American Association of Poison Control Centers has issued a warning about the dangers of synthetic marijuana products.

#### Signs of use

Synthetic marijuana users may have the following signs of use:

- Bloodshot/red eyes with normal pupil size
- Rigid muscle tone
- Altered blood pressure or body temperature
- Unstable or unpredictable mood swings
- Incoherent speech or disjointed thought processes

Detecting the substance may be difficult. Blood and urine tests can only detect some of the many synthetic compounds that may be used.

#### Legality

Although synthetic marijuana is currently legal in most states, including Alaska, authorities warn that it is a potentially dangerous and addictive substance.

Synthetic marijuana is not allowed in any ASD schools per the Students Rights and Responsibilities section of the Student Handbook. Students caught with, or using, the substance will face disciplinary action.

Authorities warn that just because a substance is legal, that doesn't mean it's safe. Anchorage police confirm instances of local teens using the substance.


