
And to all of you, continue to support this school with your time, ideas and resources. As I move into the next phase of my life I will take many memories of this place as well as the people I've met on this journey.

Alaska Performance Scholarship

The Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS) was created in 2010 as an invitation to excellence, extended to Alaska students, parents, and educators.

As part of that invitation to excellence, the APS aims to improve high school performance and better prepare Alaskans for postsecondary education and career success.

Subject to funds appropriation, first awards will be made available to the high school class of 2011. The APS can be used for up to 8 semesters (4 years) at participating regionally accredited colleges or universities in Alaska, or for approved career and technical education programs in the state. Even if you begin your studies out of state, you have up to six years after high school graduation to use the award to finish your education at a qualifying Alaska institution.

We are in our last week of classes before finals here at UAF, which means summer is just around the corner! We would like to extend our hearty congratulations to your seniors as they finish up another successful year and head off to the colleges of their choice. For your juniors (and seniors who have not yet applied), I wanted to take a brief moment to share a few deadlines, events, and updates.

Registration: open to non-degree seeking students until the first day of class at <http://www.uaf.edu/summer> for details.

Deadline for Admission Fall 2011 term: June 15...the admission deadline for traditional baccalaureate degree seeking students is June 15.

Admissions Criteria: for students with a GPA of 3.0 - test scores are required but with no minimum score. For students with a GPA of 2.5 - ACT (18) or SAT (1290) scores are required.

For students applying to UAF's Community / Technical College: There are no GPA or test score requirements however, the ACCUPLACER is required.

Changes to testing requirements: for admission into a baccalaureate program, a student must submit test scores from either the SAT or ACT (**SAT: 1290 ACT: 18**); for advising and registration math scores must be less than 1 year old. Students who have already submitted test scores may take the ACCUPLACER test for free at any UAF campus.

Campus Visits: UAF hosts campus visits daily at 10 am and 2 pm and students are invited to schedule individual appointments with the Office of Admissions.

Some of the pesky truths about paying for college / vocational school:

In case you haven't noticed college is getting very, very, expensive. This year the number of colleges with tuitions greater than \$50,000 dollar per year grew from 6 to over 50 (and many of the top schools are reporting costs may go up even more before the beginning of the 2010 – 2011 school year). If that isn't shocking enough keep in mind that a number of good jobs that required a bachelor's degree in the past will more than likely mean a getting a graduate degree in the near future (in today's money graduate units cost an average of \$400 - \$750 dollars per quarter hour).

As parents and students work out the total costs of attending a college or vocational school there is frequently more than just tuition and room/board to account for. There are the "hidden costs" that can sneak up and cause problems. A hundred students may enter as freshman and only 10 – 15% will probably graduate; the reason many students don't, can't, finish...they ran out of money.

The good news is there are many affordable options to help finance school. Any energy you invest now in researching and taking advantage of the resources available can really pay off in cutting down the final bill. It's surprising how many students get great educations for free.

The following work sheet(s) should help shed a light on what to expect when planning how to finance a college / school degree.

Hidden College Costs: how to figure the “estimated cost” for miscellaneous items:

Transportation & Airfare Costs: travel costs to and from college, e.g.: spring break, holiday breaks, etc;
 automobile expenses during the school year: gas, insurance, maintenance, etc.

College Living: Room furnishings and decorations Food purchased to eat in the room
 Computer, textbooks, reading books, etc Notebook paper and other supplies

Personal Living: Clothes (alterations), laundry / dry cleaning
 Toiletries: haircuts, perms, etc

Health: medicine and services, insurance premiums

Entertainment & Recreation
 -Eating out, Dances, concerts, lectures, theatre, movies, etc
 -Netflix, I Tunes, CDs, DVDs
 -Cable Bill, Internet account or e-mail

Communication: cell Phone / texting, telephone

- This is only an example of expenses over and above “tuition, room, and board”.
- A good rule of thumb is to add “hidden expenses” and add another 25%.
- This allows for anything extra and the cost of things inevitably going up.
- The “bottom line” will probably be a lot closer to actual “cost of education.”
