## **Independent Semester Overview**

The Independent Semester will be composed of small group of Seniors who work individually and collaboratively to study topics of interest to them and ultimately to create a project that gives back to the community. Seniors who are ahead in their credits and who have shown that they can work independently will be able to apply to the program and will be selected by a group of teachers. Those selected will be enrolled in the Independent Semester program for at least 4 of their second semester classes. They will be able to enroll in up to two other classes, so can continue with up to two year long classes.

The Independent Semester will allow students to work outside of the regular classroom setting and follow individual inquiries that are interesting and relevant to them. This will teach them the critical thinking skills of how to acquire, assess, and apply information. They will also learn communication skills as they work with their peers who are involved in the Independent Semester and share their knowledge. They will collaborate with students, teachers, and community members and learn how to provide and accept constructive feedback. Students will work on inquiries in one subject area intensely for four weeks at a time in the mornings. In the afternoons they will be working on individual Passages, which are passion-focused projects. In the final three weeks, students will work together and devote their entire school day to create a Collective Endeavor that addresses a concern in the community. Students will use self-evaluation and peer-evaluation methods to provide each other feedback and to reflect on their learning and effort. They will work with a subject teacher in each field of inquiry and will demonstrate their learning through a portfolio of their work.

At Steller, we are following the framework used by students at Monument Mountain Regional High School in Massachusetts who created the first Independent Semester. They produced an informative video that can be found at the following link http://youtu.be/REIUmGI5gLc.
